
Black Horse Pike Regional School District Spotlight on Alumni – June 2021

1. AA: Upon graduation, what post-secondary path did you take and why?

Jarel: Following graduating from Timber Creek High School, I attended The Camden County Emergency Training Center, where I graduated from 2 different academies. The Fire-Fighter (Gloucester Township Lambs Terraces) and The Emergency Medical Technician (EMT – Winslow EMS) academies. I also attended the Gloucester County and Cape May Police Academies, where I graduated and became a Police Officer for Haddon Heights, North Wildwood and currently a Police Officer at the Winslow Township Police Department

2. Describe your career/profession today?
