WHY ARE STUDENTS LEARNING THIS CONTENT AND THESE SKILLS?

Course/Unit Title: Polynomial and Rational Functions Chapter 2 Grade Level(s): 10-12	Unit Summary: In this Unit students learn to analyze and graph polynomial and rational functions. The chapter begins with identifying key characteristics and creating graphs of quadratic and other polynomial functions. Students then learn to use polynomial division to find both real and complex roots. Next they learn how to find asymptotes, intercepts and holes as they graph rational functions. Students will use specific math vocabulary associated with polynomial and rational functions.
 Essential Question(s): How do you sketch the graphs of polynomial functions? How do you divide a polynomial by another polynomial and use polynomial division to find the rational and real zeros of polynomials? How do you perform operations with complex numbers? How do you find all the zeros of a polynomials function? How do you find the domain and asymptotes of a rational function? How do you sketch the graph of a rational function? 	 Use transformations to sketch graphs of polynomial functions. Use the Leading Coefficient Test to determine end behavior of graphs of polynomial functions. Find and use zeros of polynomial functions as sketching aids. Use the Intermediate Value Theorem to help locate zeros of polynomial functions. Use synthetic division to divide polynomials by binomials of the form (x – k). Use the imaginary unit <i>i</i> to write complex numbers. Add, subtract, and multiply complex numbers. Use complex conjugates to write the quotient of two complex numbers in standard form.
